

discipline, determination and dedication.




V: How do you manage the workload of being the head of the student body alongside your academic commitments?







#### RK Rajendra Deo Singh of Poonch

We mourn the loss of RK Rajendra Deo Singh Ji of Poonch, who passed away on 27 Aug 2024. Mr Singh was a dedicated educator and a member of the Mayo College community, leaving behind a legacy of commitment and service. He joined the Mayo College General Council (MCGC) as a Life Member on 29 Nov 1991. He served as the Principal of Mayo College from 1993 to 1996, during the time he made significant contributions to the institution's growth and development. His leadership and vision were greatly appreciated by both staff and students. He will be remembered for generations for reviving Horse Riding at Mayo College.

After his tenure as Principal, Mr Singh continued to serve Mayo College in various capacities. Mr Singh was a student of Mayo College from 1941 to 1951. During his time at the school, he served as the Head Boy received the President's Gold Medal in 1950, and was the Lawn Tennis Captain for the year 1950-51. Mr R D Singh's contributions to education have left an indelible mark on everyone who had the privilege of working with him. His passion for teaching, leadership, and unwavering dedication to the betterment of his students will be remembered by all who know him.


