Ever wondered what it would be like to host a global summit at an educational institute such as Mayo College?

During the 2nd edition of the Mayo Model G2O Summit, themed 'Let There Be Light: Building a Just and Sustainable Planet', we tried to bring a global experience to a school level. For those unfamiliar, the G2O is where world leaders gather to tackle pressing global issues, and we brought a bit of that action to campus!

As Head Sherpa, my job was to keep everything running smoothly (no pressure, right?). But the real magic happened in the meeting sessions, where over 175 delegates from 22 prestigious institutions deliberated across four working groups, a finance track and the Sherpas' Meeting. The delegates took on the challenge of debating complex issues—from sustainable economies to bridging the digital divide—the kind of enthusiasm you'd expect from future world leaders. And guess what? They achieved the impossible—100% consensus on the 10-page Mayo Declaration, a blueprint for tackling global challenges. One of the highlights was the collaboration among the organising team.

Also, I never knew how many emails it took to plan a global summit...even though a mock one."

Of course, planning didn't happen without its challenges. For example, watching everyone stress over whether we had enough snacks for 'diplomats'! Turns out, even mock world leaders need to stay well-fed!

With keynote speeches from Mr Manish Chand and Mr Gurjit Singh and endless collaborations, this event was about talking policy and addressing issues that plague the modern society.

So while the real G20 might be happening elsewhere, the Mayo version was an unforgettable experience!






### Mr Shomie Das
