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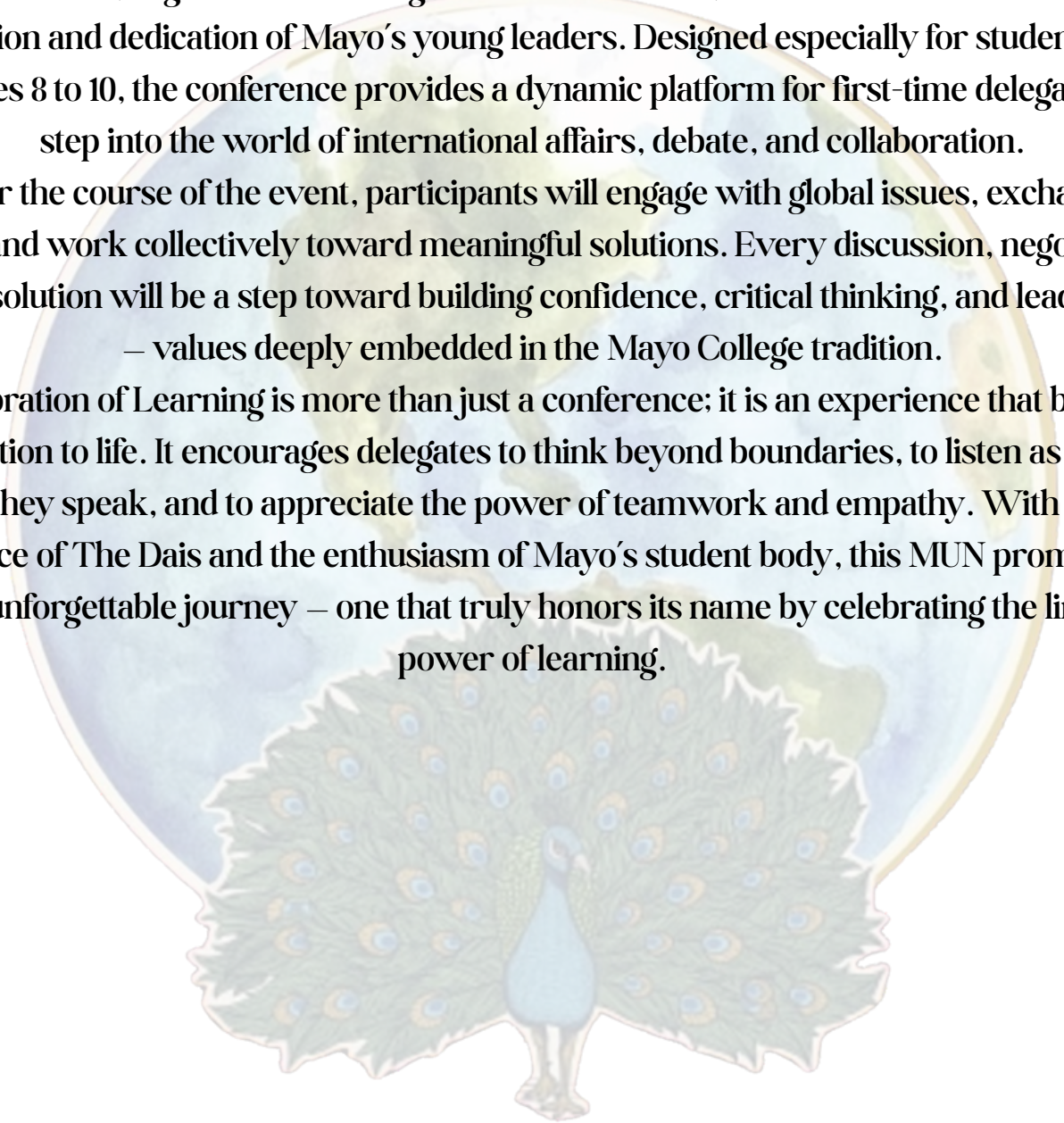
Celebration Of Learning

The Model United Nations movement, envisioned by our Principal, set us on a journey of rigorous workshops, countless miles of travel, and representation at some of the finest boarding schools across the country — proudly carrying the Mayo College flag and bringing back laurels. Watching our senior boys excel has been truly inspiring, reminding us that such excellence rests on strong foundations. As we grew with each successive conference, so did our aspirations. Though we faced our share of lows, it speaks volumes of our progress that even our lowest points now stand higher than our past highs. With that spirit, The Dais Model UN Programme was introduced — nearly 30 hours of intensive workshops, simulations, and practice sessions. On 10th October, this journey culminates in our Celebration of Learning — a showcase of ideas, collaboration, and critical thinking — centered on the vital theme of Planetary Boundaries.



Neuroscientist Jaak Panksepp discovered play circuitry in mammals, showing that play is the basis of co-operation and coexistence. Mammals play not just for fun, but to learn to live together — to test limits, read social cues, and win or lose gracefully. The games we play in cultural, sports, academic, and pastoral arenas are rehearsals for the hierarchies we must someday navigate as adults.

Over the next three days, you'll face many such games. One of them is confronting the moment when you've exhausted your knowledge — and how you respond. Some may respond defensively; others may open themselves to new learning by listening intently. Life often tests how we navigate our place in the hierarchy, but rarely do we get to practice the skills that truly help us rise — daring boldly, learning humbly, and listening attentively.

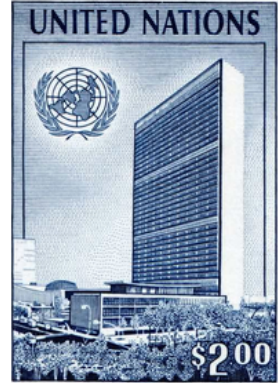
This year's theme, Planetary Boundaries, could not be more fitting. Johan Rockström, the Swedish scientist who introduced the concept, reminds us that our planet too has rules — invisible limits within which life thrives, and beyond which it falters. Much like Panksepp's mammals, who learn through play when to stop before breaking the game, humanity must learn where to draw the line between progress and destruction, ambition and arrogance. As you inhabit the roles of nations, remember — you are not just debating policies, but practising balance: between self-interest and collective good, between speaking and listening, between dominance and cooperation.

My heartfelt gratitude goes to our Principal and Vice-Principal for their vision, patience, and quiet faith — for showing up when students were weary, for allowing us to dream without fear, and for letting us stumble without judgment. To The Dais — Mr. Keshav Gupta and Mr. Devesh Gupta — your energy and enterprise have truly transformed this activity at Mayo. And finally, to our students — the real stars behind this event. If we are to realise the vision of a Mayo of the students, by the students, and for the students, then this is a tangible step in that direction.

As I look back on these past months — through moments of joy and disappointment — I know that what we created is far more than an event. Perhaps that is the true essence of this journey: that to truly learn to celebrate, we must first learn to celebrate learning itself.
